STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Southern University Law Center prepares students for the practice of law. The program of study is designed to assure that students graduate with a comprehensive knowledge of civil law and common law. Though emphasis is given to the substantive and procedural law of Louisiana, with its French and Spanish origins, Anglo-American law is well integrated into the curriculum.

Excellence in legal education is the resounding goal of the Law Center. Our faculty is totally committed to challenging and inspiring students to achieve far beyond expectations.

STATEMENT OF ACCREDITATION

Southern University is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (1866 Southern Lane, Decatur, Georgia 30033-4097; Telephone: (770) 679-4501) to award associate, bachelor's, master's, doctoral, and professional degrees. Southern University Law Center is accredited by the American Bar Association and the Supreme Court of Louisiana.

FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT OF 1974

In compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, Federal Law 92-380, information classified as "directory information" may be released to the general public without the written consent of the student. Students may request that all or any part of the directory information be withheld from the public by making written requests to the Registrar's office for the Summer Session, Fall Semester, or Spring Semester. If no request is filed, information will be released upon inquiry. No telephone inquiries will be acknowledged. All requests must be made in person.

Directory information is the only part of a student's record that may be released without the written consent of the student. No transcript or inquiries concerning an academic record will be released under any circumstances without the WRITTEN CONSENT of the student specifying the information to be released.

SPECIAL INSTRUCTIONS

1. All examination blue books will be provided and distributed by professors.
2. "I" grades shall be given only in strict compliance with regulations in the Law Center catalog.
3. All students must obtain Personal Identification Numbers (PIN) for examination purposes. Personal Identification Numbers (PIN) will be distributed by the Office of Records and Enrollment Management, November 17-21, 2008, between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m.
4. Students must use Personal Identification Numbers (PIN) on all examinations. Do NOT record real names or fictitious names on examination papers.
5. All grades are due in the Records and Enrollment Office as soon as possible, but no later than December 26, 2008.
6. Students having bona fide conflicts in the examination schedule should confer with their professor(s) and the Vice-Chancellor for Academic Affairs as soon as possible.
7. With exception of space constraints, all rules and regulations governing final examinations shall be in full force and effect.

Refunds of room rent are not given to students who vacate the residence hall without officially withdrawing from the University, or to individuals who are removed for disciplinary reasons.

Room deposit refunds are made following graduation or the presentation of proof that the student is no longer in residence during a regularly scheduled semester (i.e. Fall or Spring). Only that portion of the deposits in excess of any housing charges will be refunded.

Key deposit refunds are made to students by use of a key card credit voucher. Students who live in the residence halls shall present this voucher at registration to obtain a credit on their account. Students who no longer live in the residence halls or graduating students must secure a validated key card voucher from the Housing office and present it to the Bursar's office for a cash refund.

The unused portion of the meal ticket will be refunded upon official withdrawal from the University or for other authorized reasons.

After one year all outstanding student deposit balances generated from room deposits, key deposits, and similar deposits, shall revert or be transferred to the System Revenue Fund Operating balance. This action shall be taken after applying the credits to any outstanding student debt or Accounts Receivable due the University.

D. EXCEPTION TO POLICY BASED ON MITIGATING CIRCUMSTANCES

Any exception to this policy based on mitigating circumstances such as an accident or other extreme occurrences must have prior approval of the vice chancellors for student affairs or academic affairs, Chancellor or designee, and the chief financial officer for each campus.

Where a student is enrolled in courses, cancelled due to insufficient enrollees or other reasons, the student shall be entitled to a full refund of all fees applicable to those courses. In all other instances, the regular refund policy shall apply.

E. STUDENT FINANCIAL AID (SFA) REFUND AND REPAYMENT POLICY

The University determines the refunds due students who receive financial aid in accordance with the Higher Education Amendments of 1992, which state that the students shall receive the largest refund under:

- Applicable state law (not applicable),
- Specific refund requirements established by the school's nationally recognized accrediting agency, as approved by the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Education (not applicable), or
- The pro rata refund calculation defined in the Higher Education Amendments of 1992 if the student is attending the school for the first time and withdrew on or before the 60 percent point of the enrollment period.

If the student does not qualify to receive a refund under the pro rata refund calculation, the refund is the largest of the Federal Refund Policy or the University policy previously stated.

F. SATISFACTORY ACADEMIC PROGRESS POLICY

Students receiving federal student financial aid must maintain "Satisfactory Academic Progress" in order to be eligible to receive aid. The Financial Aid Office evaluates Satisfactory Academic Progress after the completion of each academic year, generally two semesters. There are three components to satisfactory progress: a qualitative standard (grade point average); an incremental quantitative standard (number of credits attempted and earned for each year of study); and a maximum timeframe for the degree or program. All courses attempted must be factored into the determination of satisfactory academic progress.

CROSS REGISTRATION PROGRAM

The Southern University Law Center/Louisiana State University Law Center cross-registration program enables full-time second and third year law students at each institution to take courses at the other without additional fees as an extension of its program offerings.

Applications for cross-registration may be obtained from the Registrar's office at the Law Center.

LAW STUDENTS' RESPONSIBILITIES

As a law student, it is your responsibility to:

1. Enroll in the proper classes and to ensure that there are no errors in scheduling.
2. Register during assigned priority dates to increase your chances of securing the desired classes.
3. Enroll in any required classes previously dropped that are needed for graduation.
4. Keep your address current to ensure that your billing statement reaches the correct address.

REGULAR REGISTRATION PROCEDURES

Students who registered early should follow the procedures listed below:

1. If you received a billing statement by mail and have paid your fees, your registration process is almost complete. Proceed to step 6.
2. If you received a billing statement by mail, and have not paid your fees, proceed to step 5.
3. If you did not receive a billing statement by mail, report to online billing located in the Law Center Lobby to obtain your billing statement.
4. For the following adjustments, report to the following locations:
 - a) Course load adjustment - Vice Chancellor's office
 - b) Previous balance adjustment - Accounts & Receivables
 - c) Loan or scholarship adjustment - Financial Aid office
5. Pay fee balance shown on Billing Statement at the Cashier's Station (Law Center Lobby). If balance shows zero or a credit amount, you must have your statement of account validated at the Cashier's Station to complete registration.
6. Pay vehicle registration fee at the Cashier's Station (Law Center Lobby).
7. After fees have been paid, report to the Photo ID Station (Law Center Lobby).

Students who did not register early should follow the procedures listed below:

1. Complete a Registration Scheduling Worksheet.
2. Schedule classes via JAGNET.
3. Report to Online Billing Station (Law Center Atrium).
4. For the following adjustments, report to the following locations:
 - a) Previous balance adjustment - Accounts & Receivables (Law Center Atrium)
 - c) Loan or scholarship adjustment - Financial Aid office
5. Pay fee balance shown on billing statement at the Cashier's Station (Law Center Atrium). If balance shows zero or a credit amount, you must have your statement of account validated at the Cashier's Station to complete registration.

Students *may not* register for cross-registration courses through Online Registration.

You will be informed of holds, delinquencies, closed classes, class time conflicts, course repetition, and un-met prerequisites by JAGNET. Problems will have to be resolved in person at the Record's office during the "Special Registration Period." If the University places a hold on your academic records, you will be unable to use Online Registration until such time that the hold is removed. If you wish to remove such holds from your records, you must report to the office identified by the Telephone Voice Response (TVR) system.

JAGNET hours of operation are 7:30 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Sunday.

Students may add or drop as many courses as they wish during the registration period without charge.
